RE: Coronavirus (COVID-19) cases

The Central Michigan District Health Department (CMDHD) continues to conduct disease surveillance and investigations related to notification of positive results of COVID-19 received through private laboratories, healthcare providers and the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services. CMDHD will continue to contact those who have been in close contact with the patients and they will be assessed for symptoms and monitored appropriately.

As of 2:00 p.m. on March 22, 2020, CMDHD has been notified of positive results in the following counties:

“We will continue to see more and more confirmed and suspected cases of COVID-19 in our area” says Dr. Jennifer Morse, Medical Director for Central Michigan District Health Department. “Just 12 days ago, the first case of COVID-19 in Michigan was identified and as of 2:00 p.m. on March 22, 2020, a total of 1,035 cases have been confirmed in our state. Continuing to practice proven control measures such as hand washing, avoiding touching eyes, nose and mouth, avoiding close contact with others, staying home if feeling sick, covering your mouth and nose when you cough or sneeze, and disinfecting frequently touched surfaces daily, are extremely

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important to slow the spread of this illness.” “It’s also important to practice social distancing (keep at least six feet between yourself and others),” states Steve Hall, Health Officer for Central Michigan District Health Department.

If you think you have been exposed to COVID-19 and develop a fever and symptoms, such as cough or difficulty breathing, call your healthcare provider for medical advice. An automated self-checker is available to help you make decisions and seek appropriate medical care at <https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/symptoms-testing/symptoms.html>. Those most at-risk include older adults and those with chronic medical conditions, like heart or lung disease or diabetes.
